THE ROSBERCON THREE

On the 5th of June 1798, the day of the battle of Ross, both Rosbercon and Tullogher areas were a hive of rebel activity. The local rebels of Rosbercon village were about 40 in number whilst the Tullogher contingent under the local rebel leader James Hanrahan were said to be in the region of 100 men. They were armed with a few guns, pikes and turf slanes. The rebels were assembled at the Mile Bush to prevent any redcoat reinforcements marching from Kilkenny to the relief of Ross. A local royalist, Robert Taylor and his son Matthew who were toll keepers on the Ross bridge, ended up on the Rosbercon side of the bridge and were quickly spotted by the local rebels.

The Taylors entered the fields to the rear of the present boat club with the rebels close on their heels heading as fast as they could to a safe house in Tinneranny. Having reached the safe house of Everitt's in Garranbehy they were quickly admitted and the door, according to Mrs. Everitt, was heavily bolted behind them. The rebels began stoning the house and then set fire to the thatched roof. The occupants fled out the back door and headed for another safe house in Tinneranny. Mr. Taylor fired his gun at the pursuing rebels who eventually caught up and killed him and his son.

Three men, Joyce from Inistioge, Ryan from Ballyfoile and Lee from Ross were arrested and charged with their murder in August 1799 at Waterford County Court. Although pleading not guilty the main prosecution witness was a man named Thomas Kearney a recognised notorious rogue and now turned informant gave his concocted evidence of having personally witnessed the murders pointing the finger of guilt at Joyce and Ryan. They were then found guilty and sentenced to death but Lee was acquitted.

Strong appeals against the sentences were lodged by the Inistioge Community in Joyce's defence. As a result of the Act of Amnesty the evidence of the informant was dismissed and both men received clemency from the court. It is not known what became of them afterwards, most likely with them having been active rebels during the rebellion they were forced into the army to fight elsewhere, which was normal practice at the time.
