A Message from Fr. Dan: Our Father who Art in Heaven: The Our Father is the first prayer that many of us learned. It is still many people's favourite prayer. It was given to us by Jesus, and it is the prayer that Jesus prayed many times in his own lifetime. The Our Father was given to the Apostles in the midst of Jesus' final journey to Jerusalem where he suffered and died.

The Our Father is a very complex prayer and contains depths of spirituality. In the first part of the prayer, we ask that God's Kingdom would come, that his will be done and that he would give us our daily bread.

A very important teaching of the Our Father is that God will "Forgive us our Trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." Just as there can be no life without food, there can be no life without forgiveness. Without forgiveness our world would be a place of hatred, revenge, and retaliation. It would be a world full of fear and dread. Without forgiveness we cannot let go of hurt and resentment. With forgiveness we return to the same one road, and we continue to travel together. The world of forgiveness is a world where there is arenewal of life, peace, and hope. When we forgive others who have wronged us, we are open to God's mercy towards us, and we become channels of God's mercy towards others. We give to others the gift of forgiveness that God has given us.

The Our Father continues, 'Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil' When we pray not to be led into temptation, we ask God not to put us to the test. A test in the bible is a trial to see how faithful we are. God tested Abraham when he asked him to sacrifice his only son, Isaac. In this part of the Our Father we are asking God to save us from moments in life when we are tempted to choose something other than our loyalty to God. We conclude the Our Father by asking God to deliver us from evil.

The Our Father is the most beautiful prayer that we have. Every time we pray the Our Father, we reflect on how we all belong to the one human family.

GREAT EXCITEMENT IN ROSBERCON 1887

The 18th September 1887 was an occasion of great celebration in Rosbercon on the opening of the new railway station. The railway linked New Ross with Dublin via Chapel and Macmine Junction prior to which the nearest rail link was either Mullinavat or Ballywilliam Stations. At the time there was little celebration in Ross as the big merchants of the town had fought hard and failed to have the station situated on their side of the river. Although the national railway system had reached Waterford and Wexford by the 1860's it took a further 28 years to reach New Ross.

In the 1850's a rail link was proposed to connect Rosbercon with Thomastown via Inistioge and Listerlin however this never materialised. The new Rosbercon line was an immediate financial success resulting in further plans to extend the line to Waterford, construction of which commenced in August 1898. In it construction it employed 200 men and 40 horses and cart units. According to surviving records, the construction costs of Rosbercon Station were £1033.76 and an additional £235.00 for an engine turntable. The Red Bridge over the Barrow cost £21,234.00. The new Waterford link opened to traffic on 15th February 1904 with a station situated at Aylwardstown.

The construction of the railway system in general, resulted in much needed employment. For example, house No.7 at Ballyverneen accommodated a family of 7. Another very important railway link for New Ross traders was the opening of the Waterford to Rosslare line in 1906 giving a direct link with the UK. In the 1950's/60's Rosbercon Station was a very busy place for almost all town trade and passengers. There was considerable movement of fertiliser, malting grain, roofing felt, cable, leather, beet and livestock all within a relatively small station area. The regular staff resided mostly in the village who worked hard and gave a good service. We can today thankfully look forward to seeing the old station and rail line site converted to a much-appreciated Greenway.
