## A Message from Fr Dan: Looking forward to Mission Sunday:

Two weeks from now on the 20th October we will be celebrating Mission Sunday. Mission Sunday reminds us each year of our missionaries working in the countries of Africa and Asia and across the world caring for the poor and the marginalised. They need our prayers and support. We think especially of those who work with the victims of war, poverty and hunger.

Pope Francis continually emphasises how mission is central to the role of the Church. The pope has constantly spoken of the major contribution that the various missionary societies of men, women and lay people are making to the ongoing task of bringing the good news of salvation to the world. We in Ireland can take special pride in what Irish Missionaries have achieved. In the Diocese of Ossory, in the parish of Rosbercon we rejoice in what our own priests, brothers, sisters and lay personnel have given. We think too of the prayers, support and finances that our people have offered over the past 100 years in missionary engagement.

Pope Francis is again reminding us this year that that the mission of Christ is ongoing, embracing all peoples of every creed and religious denomination. Since Vatican II the Church's mission to the world has become more inclusive. Pope John XXIII and the Popes who came after him, emphasise that mission is to the world. The Church in modern times sees itself as working to bring about the Kingdom of God especially in areas where there is widespread abuse of human rights and where the growth of capitalism and industrialization have marginalized the native peoples.

The mission of the Church cannot be separated from the problems of the world. There is an ever-increasing divide between the 'haves' and the 'have nots' and there is a massive refugee problem resulting from religious persecution and poverty. Global warming, even now, is posing such a threat to the wellbeing of Planet Earth. We cannot ignore the 33% of the world's population living below the poverty line. We celebrate the efforts of the missionaries, who are working to confront these enormous challenges. Those who support them are missionaries themselves. The weekend after next will remind us again of the depth of Ireland's missionary heritage. The success of our Missionaries will always rely on the prayers and generosity of the Irish people.

#### **History of the Holy Faith Premises:**

The original Convent premises has a very interesting history spread over past years and which has being added to considerably by the Holy Faith Nuns since their arrival in the parish in 1924. The original building was first erected in 1833 as a Fever Hospital with a separate Dispensary for the relief of the sick and poor of the Barony of IDA the land area of which is quite similar to the general land area of the parish today. It was financed from public funds and had accommodation for some 20 patients. The Dispensary, which was a small building, was situated beside the present Convent entrance to make available free medicine and medical assistance on an out patient basis. By 1833 such fever hospitals and dispensaries existed throughout the county of Kilkenny, Inistioge had such a hospital in 1828.

There are some interesting references to the Hospital in the surviving minutes of the New Ross Poor House records which was then responsible for the accommodation of our parish sick and poor both prior to and during the faming years and thereafter. An entry dated 16th October 1847 at the height of the famine period recorded a request to the Rosbercon Hospital to take in additional fever cases because of gross overcrowding at a cost of 5/- per week. A further entry dated 19th January 1848 states Dr Niraham's expenses of £17-0-10 for the treatment of fever patients at Rosbercon Fever Hospital has being paid. By 1847 fever hospitals in general were overcrowded with sick people and had to construct what was then called an outdoor fever shed. Rosbercon has such a shed within its grounds. Following the worst years of the Famine the Hospital closed in 1851 due primarily to cost cutting measures whilst the Dispensary continued to function on the hill. There is a later entry in the Poor House records dated October 1869 when a notice to guit the then vacant Rosbercon Hospital was served on them by the local Vicar of Rosbercon the Rev Mr Reeves who it appears had some sort of title to the property as he had being in receipt of the dreaded Tithe Applotment Tithes which were paid on behalf of the Hospital in previous years by the Poor House Guardians. He most likely succeeded as such influential people were then all powerful and got whatever they wanted at the expense of the poor man in the street. The property was converted to a private residence soon after where it remained until the Holy Faith Nuns arrival in 1924.
